Professions/Leadership: A former Senior English & Psychology teacher, and Syracuse University American Management Association instructor, Marlene is founder/owner of two small companies, author of numerous books and leadership programs. 1 of 15 in the world to have earned the combined degrees of Certified Professional Speaker & Certified Management Consultant, she traveled extensively as an internationally recognized business futurist speaker and consultant. In 2001 Marlene was 1 of 20 recipients awarded the 1st CNY Outstanding Women in Business Awards. In 2005, Marlene was one of 20 recipients awarded the 1st Mohawk Valley Outstanding Women in Business Awards. Since 2001, she has been the Executive Director of the Children's Museum of History, Science and Technology in Utica, NY.

Designed and maintains at no charge the local Rotary and Children's Museum websites.

Accomplishments: 1.) Was a successful area teacher for many years; 2.) Served as Chairman of the Board of Directors for the Children's Museum; 3.) Through her tireless efforts over the past ten years overseeing the Children's Museum operations, she's been instrumental in opening additional floors and growing the exhibits and offerings for school children, area families, tourists; 4.) Secured grants to renovate the building, and got it declared a NYS and Federal Historic Building; 5.) Chartered one of thirteen Rotary eClubs authorized by Rotary International; 6.) was Elected 2007-08 District Governor of Rotary District 7150 (the third women to hold this honor in our CNY district); 7.) Traveled to India at her own expense to take part in the ribbon cutting of a Rotary woman's computer school (giving them skills to go from begging on the streets to working in factories); 8.) Traveled to Haiti at her own expense to begin a Rotary water & sanitation project; 9.) Started a personal Endowment Fund at the Community Foundation for future use by The Children's Museum.

Challenges: While a divorced single mom living on welfare, she attended college and earned her teaching degree. Shortly after she began teaching, a serious auto accident left her without a kneecap in her right knee. While her body was slowed down, her mind and spirit never was. As the first instructor for MVCC's 'Women in Transition', her personal story of tragedy and triumph inspired many local women to begin their lives anew. In 2001, while serving as Chairman of the Children's Museum Board of Directors, Marlene discovered the museum was in a serious financial condition. Rather than closing the doors, she & husband Earl Lewis chose to keep the museum open. They continue to work as unpaid volunteers, constantly growing this valuable community asset: an educational resource, family quality of life, & tourism attraction.

Priorities: Marlene states her number one priority in life is her family and her God, followed closely by her profession & her community. In her spare time, she loves to research, read, update websites, work on museum goals, play the piano, serve as a mentor to other women, and most of all spend time with her children & grandchildren.
